Trash Receptacles (Mike Jordan)

Many trash and recycle containers are being left on street after the Wednesday pickup. The following guidelines will help in trash collection and neighborhood aesthetics

- ✓ Have containers and/or items for pickup at the street between 5:00 p.m. the day prior to your day of collection and 7:00 a.m. the day of collection.
- ✓ Keep at least 3 feet of clearance between your container and any other item (yard waste bags, limbs, bulky items, mailboxes, cable boxes, or vehicles) including the blue recycle container.
- ✓ Cans that are overflowing will not be collected. The lid should be able to close securely
- ✓ Remove containers from public view at the end of collection day.
- ✓ Clearly label your container with your address and record your container serial number.
- ✓ Loose trash in can should be bagged, to reduce litter.
- ✓ No other garbage will be collected outside of the black can except for yard waste.

Virginia Wesleyan News (Ray Duffy)

Today through February 17, the Virginia Wesleyan University Concert Series joins WHRO Public Media in presenting a Virtual Chamber Series. Concerts & interviews with the artists will be broadcast on air and online.





Public Utilities Payment Assistance

VA State Coronavirus Utility Relief Funding

Limited Time Only! The VA State Coronavirus Utility Relief Funding is a one-time payment assistance to water/sewer customers with financial hardship directly or indirectly caused by COVID-19. Eligible customers may have received a recent courtesy call regarding availability of this relief.

City Services Bill Pandemic Relief Program

The City Services Bill Pandemic Relief Program provides financial assistance to qualifying residential customers who are experiencing financial hardship due to being unemployed, furloughed, or laid off in March 2020 or later.

City Services Account Payment Plan (NOT YET AVAILABLE - Coming mid-January)

The City Services Account Payment Plan is available to qualifying residential customers who are experiencing financial hardship due to COVID-19. This allows customers to set up a payment schedule over a period of 2 to 24 months for existing balances.
