Safety Patrol-Carbon Monoxide CO:

Where is CO found?

CO is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces. CO can build up indoors and poison people and animals who breathe it.

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What are the symptoms of CO poisoning?

The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. CO symptoms are often described as "flu-like." If you breathe in a lot of CO it can make you pass out or kill you. People who are sleeping or drunk can die from CO poisoning before they have symptoms.

How can I prevent CO poisoning in my home?

- Install a battery-operated or battery back-up CO detector in your home.
- Have your heating system, water heater, and any other gas, oil, or coal burning appliances serviced by a qualified technician every year.
- Do not use portable flameless chemical heaters indoors.
- If you smell an odor from your gas refrigerator have an expert service it. An odor from your gas refrigerator can mean it could be leaking CO.
- When you buy gas equipment, buy only equipment carrying the seal of a national testing agency, such as Underwriters' Laboratories.
- Make sure your gas appliances are vented properly. Horizontal vent pipes for appliances, such as a water heater, should go up slightly as they go toward outdoors, as shown below. This prevents CO from leaking if the joints or pipes aren't fitted tightly.
- Have your chimney checked or cleaned every year. Chimneys can be blocked by debris. This can cause CO to build up inside your home or cabin.
- Never patch a vent pipe with tape, gum, or something else. This kind of patch can make CO build up in your home, cabin, or camper.
- Never use a gas range or oven for heating. Using a gas range or oven for heating can cause a build up of CO inside your home, cabin, or camper.
- Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal red, gray, black, or white gives off CO.
- Never use a portable gas camp stove indoors. Using a gas camp stove indoors can cause CO to build up inside your home, cabin, or camper.
- Never use a generator inside your home, basement, or garage or less than 20 feet from any window, door, or vent.
- When using a generator, use a battery-powered or battery backup CO detector in your home.

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History Corner

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In the Garden: Over-seeding your lawn

In simple terms, the act of over-seeding is merely spreading seed over an existing lawn. If done right, over-seeding can keep your lawn looking great for years to come. Overseeding is generally done to either remedy or stay ahead of a grass thinning problem, whereas reseeding directly addresses barren or dead spots in the yard.

The type of seed used is important, but you'll want to weigh your goals for the project first. Some homeowners may want to reinforce their thinning, <u>warm-season grass with a cool-season seed</u> in the late summer to keep the grass green through its usually dormant winter months. Others may just want to fill in some thinning areas right in the middle of the prime growing season for the existing grass using the same grass seed type that's in place.

General rules for when you should over-seed say that spring and fall are for coolseason grasses and late spring through mid-summer are for warm-season grasses. If at least 50% of the grass is in good condition and the rest is only thinned, not barren, overseeding is a good option.

Free COVID-19 Community Vaccination Clinics Next Week

The Virginia Beach Department of Public Health continues partnerships with local churches and community centers to offer free COVID-19 vaccination clinics next week. Available vaccines include Johnson & Johnson (one dose), and the first and second doses of Moderna, and Pfizer (Comirnaty). Third doses are also available, as directed by the CDC, for those individuals who are immunocompromised. This includes people who have received an organ transplant, who are actively being treated for cancer, who have HIV, or are receiving any other treatment that affects their immune system.
