- 1. Provide adult supervision
- 2. Stay on the sidewalks
- 3. Carefully check candy

- 7. Jack-o-lantern safety
- 8. Home decoration safety

<u>In the Garden:</u> A few choice tips from the internet.

- Keep all plants, especially newly planted perennials, trees, and shrubs (especially evergreens) adequately watered until the ground freezes, if your soil is dry.
- This is the time to fertilize trees if a soil test indicated nutrient deficiencies.
- Be consistent about disconnecting your hose from the faucet to prevent freeze damage.
- Have your sprinkler system blown out this month, and protect your backflow preventer and any other above-ground parts with a waterproof insulated jacket to keep them from freezing.
- Clean up dropped fruit and fallen leaves from fruit trees; compost if healthy. Discard any diseased fruit and leaves.
- Cover any bare soil in your garden. <u>Spread an organic mulch</u> like wood chips to build up your soil structure and protect plants from heaving over the winter.
- Continue weeding. Focus first on pulling creeping, hardy perennials like bindweed or horsetail. After that, pull any annual weeds that'll spread their seeds all over your garden. Fewer seeds now = fewer weeds next year!.
- Pull and dispose of anything that looks diseased or bug-infested. Look for mildew on leaves, dark blotches on stems, signs of rot, unmanageable insect pests or damage. Don't put diseased landscape plants in your compost pile.
- Get a soil test if you haven't done so in the past three years. When you get the results, amend and fertilize your soil.
- Protect or store any pots or planters that won't survive outside
- Winterize water features (ponds, fountains, etc.)

October is National Crime Prevention month—a time when the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) asks us to renew or join the commitment to help "Take A Bite Out Of Crime®." In 1984, October was designated as Crime Prevention Month through a Presidential proclamation and since then, NCPC has been working with local law enforcement, government agencies, civic groups, schools and businesses, and other organizations to help them spread the word about crime prevention and personal safety.

2021 Crime Prevention Month Themes

The National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) selects annual themes based on crime trends and local feedback. NCPC works with national partners to provide free, online resources to help communities address these trends locally. Resources—training programs, blogs, podcasts, downloadable education materials, and links—will help law enforcement, crime prevention practitioners, and community groups plan and implement CSC events during Crime Prevention Month or throughout the year. Budgets are tight, so it's more important than ever to emphasize prevention by recognizing past successes, organizing new CSC events, and planning for the future.



Free COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics offered at Virginia Beach City Public Schools the Week of Oct. 18

Virginia Beach City Public Schools and the Virginia Beach Department of Public Health have partnered to offer free COVID-19 vaccinations to students, faculty, staff and the general public, the week of Oct. 18, 2021 at several schools.

Ages 12-17 will be offered the Pfizer vaccine and will need to be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Adults will have the option of either the two dose Pfizer (Comirnaty), two dose Moderna, or one dose Johnson & Johnson vaccines.

Sandler Center to Host Opening Reception for Gallery Exhibition on Nov. 1

The Sandler Center for the Performing Arts, Sandler Center Foundation and the Virginia Beach Cultural Affairs Department will host an opening reception for "Five Women. Five Studios. Five Mediums," by Working Artists Studios, on Monday, Nov. 1, 2021, from 6-8 p.m. in the Sandler Center Art Gallery, 201 Market St., Virginia Beach.

The Flood Protection Program bond referendum is on the current ballot

Virginia Beach residents still have several opportunities to get informed about the Flood Protection Program bond referendum that is on the current General Election ballot. The bond referendum asks residents to vote on authorizing \$567.5 million dollars in debt to fund the design and construction of 21 projects included in Phase 1 of the citywide Flood Protection Program.

In-person and virtual meetings are set for the coming weeks. City staff will be on hand to provide details on the Phase 1 projects and to answer questions.

An in-person meeting (pending impacts of COVID-19) will take place on **Monday, Oct. 25 at 5:30 p.m.** at the Central Library, 4100 Virginia Beach Blvd.
