Safety Patrol-

Every year, April is observed as Distracted Driving Awareness Month to mitigate the prevalence of distracted driving on United States roadways.

1. **Don't Text and Drive.** Texting and driving is often at the center of distracting driving prevention campaigns,
2. **Talking on the Phone While Driving Is Dangerous.** Talking on the phone may seem harmless, especially if you are on speaker or using Bluetooth
3. **Listen to Music at a Low Volume.** Since loud music can drown out outside sounds, it is considered a form of distraction.
4. **Don't Overload Your Car with Passengers.** Music is not the only sound that can be distracting; noisy passengers can also be very distracting.
5. **Don't Eat while Driving.** Eating while driving can take your attention -- and eyes -- off the road,.
6. **Set Up Your Navigation App or GPS Beforehand.** Looking down at your dash or phone to review your route while driving is dangerous
7. **Leave Multitasking for Life Outside the Car.** While multitasking is an important life skill, it is never a good idea to attempt it while driving.
8. **When Fatigue Hits, Pull Over.** Fatigue is a serious driver distraction.
9. **If You're Driving with a Baby, Have a Co-Pilot.** Driving with a baby on board can be nerve-racking for even the most experienced drivers.
10. **Speak Up and Help Out** The danger level of distracted driving is often equated to that of drunk driving.

Crime Prevention- FOMO Scam (from AARP)

Another scam making the headlines is the FOMO scam-fear of missing out. Like all scams this one preys upon your emotions. Often you'll hear about incredibly great deals. Sometimes these "deals" come from friends, but actually people who use your social media to impersonate your friends. Most of these FOMOs require you to send some up-front money in order to get in. They are similar to the Nigerian prince who just left you a million dollars scam but in this case they come from what appears to be trusted friends or relatives. Don't fall for it. Beware the words "that everybody is doing it".

Yard Debris and Collection:

Yard Debris Collection

- Curbside collection of yard waste is provided on your normal collection day, and does not require a work order.
- Limbs - **up to 4 feet long and 6 inches in diameter** will be collected in **two piles not to exceed 4 x 4 x 4 feet**.
- Yard debris should be placed at the front curb of the residence where generated. Please do not block drainage.
- Grass and Leaves (no dirt or mulch) in **up to 25 clear plastic bags, not more than 25 lbs. per bag**

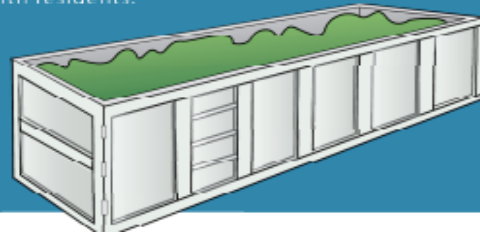


Yard Debris Drop-Off

Virginia Beach residents may also take brush and tree trimmings free of plastic bags to the City of Virginia Beach Landfill and Resource Recovery Center at 1989 Jake Sears Road to be recycled into mulch for use in City landscaping projects. Proof of Virginia Beach residency must be provided.

Yard Debris Container Rental

- For larger amounts of yard debris, containers measuring 13 x 7 x 5 feet, are available for a fee on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Tree limbs must be **no larger than 6 inches in diameter** and must fit totally within the container.
- No clear plastic bags in container.
- You may schedule the container for a 24-hour period on weekdays; containers delivered on Friday will be picked up Monday morning.
- Containers cannot be used for debris resulting from clearing of vacant lots.
- No dirt, trash, furniture, or construction debris allowed.
- Other restrictions apply and a signed contract is required. Please call well in advance of your need to use the container as this service is very popular with residents.



In the Garden: Basic April Chores:

- Fall and winter leave a lot of branches, dead leaves, and debris behind. Clear your garden, lawn and flower borders of any such debris so that you can prepare for the planting season.
- You may also want to get rid of old, growth of herbaceous perennials and deciduous grass this early spring. This is also the time to do a lot of weeding in your garden.
- Once you are through removing weeds, winter mulches, and debris, you can start digging and preparing your garden for planting. Assuming that the soil is not too wet and difficult to work on.
- After clearing all the debris, nourish your soil with compost or well-rotted manure, if available.
- This will feed the beneficial microorganisms in the soil and also encourage insect activity. Applying nutrients to the soil nourishes it, making it richer.

- If you don't have compost or manure, apply a slow-release fertilizer. Just make sure not to use traditional synthetic lawn fertilizers for your garden.
- Snails, slugs, and aphids usually hide and hibernate in the crowns of perennial plants throughout the winter.
- These garden bugs come out in the warm weather to wreak havoc on your plants during spring and summer.
- If you look closer, you could also find white vine weevil larvae in your compost heap. These larvae would feed on the roots of your plants. Be sure to treat your plants for vine weevils as well.
