<u>CPERT</u>: Work continues on our Disaster Preparedness team. We plan to introduce this important plan at the meeting identified above. Maybe we think major disasters can't happen to us but it pays to be prepared.

Disaster Prep-

- Prepare to be self-sufficient for at least three days by putting together an emergency kit, including: non-perishable food, water, a flashlight, a portable, battery-operated radio or television, batteries, medicines, anti-bacterial hand wipes or gel, first aid kit, money, seasonal clothing, and sanitation supplies.
- Conduct practice drills so you and your family know the safe locations in your home for each type of emergency. Decide how and where your family will reunite if separated.
 Choose an out-of-state friend or relative that separated family members can call to report their whereabouts and conditions.
- Learn first aid and CPR from your local Red Cross chapter or other community organizations.
- Learn how to shut off gas, water and electricity in case the lines are damaged.
 Make sure insurance coverage is up-to-date and reflects present property values. Check on flood insurance.
- Compile an inventory of home contents. Take pictures and/or video. Store in a safe place.
- Check chimneys, roofs, walls and foundations for stability. Make sure your house is bolted to its foundation.
- Secure your water heater and major appliances, as well as tall, heavy furniture, hanging plants, picture frames and mirrors (especially those over beds).
- Make arrangements for pets.
- Organize your neighborhood to be self-sufficient after a disaster.

Crime Prevention:

- Have deadbolts installed on your doors, and keep all doors and windows locked.
- Draw the curtains at night, and keep the outside and inside of your house well lit.
- Install motion sensor lights outside, and use automatic timers on lamps.
- Install a peephole in your door.
- Do not leave extra keys in obvious places outside.
- If possible, install a home security system.

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- If you live feel unsafe. Do not buzz anyone in unless you are certain you know who they
- Retrieve your mail as soon as possible from your mailbox, or set up a P.O. box, so sensitive mail cannot be stolen.
- When possible, mail letters directly at the post office or with your postal worker.
- Physical checks can be stolen from mailboxes or easily picked up by someone who enters your home. It's best to have your benefit checks deposited directly into your account.
- Keep your doors locked, and do not invite contractors or sales people in. Ask for identification, even if they say it is an emergency.
- If necessary, call the company to confirm the individual is meant to be there.
- Call a neighbor or 911 if you sense something is not right.
- Maintain control over your finances, and monitor accounts for abnormal withdrawals.
- Regularly review your will, power of attorney, and property titles

In the Garden: November chores:

- Plant trees, shrubs, perennials before the ground freezes
- Make <u>leaf mold</u> compost out of fallen leaves and other organic matter
- Pull out any remaining weeds from your garden beds and vegetable garden
- Remove remains of dead annual plants and add to compost
- Select some plants to leave for overwintering beneficial creatures
- Store potting soil for wintertime
- Find and prep spring seed starting supplies for your future flower garden
- Remove rotten fruit from branches and fallen fruit from the ground
- Clean gardening tools and sharpen for early spring
- Gardening tools like a garden fork or shovel should be put away
- Clean empty planter pots, window boxes and containers
- Mulch flower beds with compost.
- Shred leaves with the lawnmower or a blower vac
- Plant spring bulbs that were left
- Harvest frost-sweetened kale
- Cut back herbaceous perennials. leave some seed heads standing
- Pruning should be limited to dead/damaged/diseased/dying branches.
- Pick fall cranberries
- Leave a few carrots, potatoes in the ground for Thanksgiving dinner
- Winter spinach should start to be ready.
- Sharpen and oil garden tools (and add a few to your holiday wish list!)
- Birds and other animals will still rely on the food that comes from bird feeders

Safety Patrol- Turkey Frying

1. Stay Away from The House – Set up the turkey fryer more than 10 feet away from your home and keep children and pets away. Never leave it unattended.

2. Find Flat Ground – The oil must be even and steady at all times to ensure safety. Place the fryer on a flat, level surface and carefully gauge the amount of oil needed.

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- 3. Use a Thawed and Dry Turkey Make sure your Thanksgiving turkey is completely thawed and dry. Extra water will cause the oil to bubble furiously and spill over. If oil spills from the fryer onto the burner, it can cause a fire.
- 4. Monitor the Temp Use caution when touching the turkey fryer. The lid and handle can become very hot and could cause burns. Also be sure to keep track of the oil's temperature as many fryers do not have their own thermostats.
- 5. Be Prepared Have a fire extinguisher (multipurpose, dry-powder) ready at all times in the event that the oil ignites.
