Disaster Prep-Survival-Rule of Three:



Crime Prevention: Once again let's review a few key thoughts.

- Lock your car doors. Not just at night but all the time.
- Either secure or remove valuables from your car, especially firearms
- Keep your front porch light on at night.
- Report commercial solicitors.
- Shut your garage doors, especially at night
- Don't engage with telephone solicitors.
- Don't click on unsolicited links to websites
- Protect your accounts with strong passwords and dual authentication
- IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING, DO SOMETHING.

In the Garden: October chores:



- Send a sample of your soil into your local cooperative extension to be tested, and add any amendments they recommend.
- ② Clean up your garden beds by removing any dead plant material. Use any disease-free garden debris to start a new compost pile.
- Rake any fallen leaves from your lawn and garden.
- ② As soon as the weather becomes cooler, plant any new trees and shrubs you want to grow for the following year.
- Plant any cool-season annuals.
- ② Cover your mums, asters, and other fall flowers on nights where the forecast calls for frost.
- ② Save seeds from some of your season's most successful varietals. Harvest and dry them out, then place them in a paper envelope, writing the plant name and year on it before putting the envelope in an airtight container. Store in a cool, dark, dry location.
- Harvest and preserve herbs for cooking. They can be either dried or frozen.
- Remove any green tomatoes left on your tomato plants.
- Harvest your winter squash once their vines die back or, at the very latest, before a hard freeze.
- Continue to pick your cool-season crops (whether they're underground crops like beets or cold crops like cauliflower) whenever they are ready.

<u>Safety Patrol</u>- Halloween Safety Tips:



- Don't keep candles burning in Jack-o'-lanterns or luminaries. Consider using battery-operated flames.
- 2. You might also opt for a safer pumpkin "carving" by painting them or decorating with stickers.
- 3. Look for flame-resistant costumes, wigs, and accessories and make sure your dress or outfit is the proper length and fit, so you don't trip or catch fire.
- 4. If applying face paint, be careful around the eyes and test for any skin allergies.
- 5. Avoid using contact lenses that alter the look or color of your eyes as they can be hazardous to your eye health.
- 6. Use a flashlight, LED light, or apply reflective tape to your costume to see and be seen by others, including cars.
- 7. If you wear a mask, test for full visibility out of the eye holes and proper breathability.
- 8. Inspect candy before eating. Never let kids go in a house to accept candy.
- 9. If your costume requires a sword or weapon, do not swing it around and keep the pointed part away from yourself and others.

Virginia Beach Continues to Collect Yard Waste

City of Virginia Beach Public Works/Waste Management crews continue to collect yard waste following Tropical Storm Ian. To better assist residents, Waste Management shares the following:

- 1. Due to the high volume of material, residents can expect delays in yard waste collection and may notice yard waste trucks in their neighborhood on different days than their trash day.
- Waste Management is utilizing two types of trucks for yard debris collection. Rearloading yard waste trucks are used for the manual collection of bagged yard waste. Larger piles of tree trimmings are being removed by mechanical means (boom trucks).
- 3. Residents can place bagged yard waste in their trash carts.
- 4. Residents are encouraged to please make one or two large piles, rather than multiple small piles, as this allows for crews to be more efficient when collecting yard debris. Two piles, generated from each house, will be collected. Pile(s) cannot exceed 4 x 4 x 4 feet.
- 5. For larger amounts of yard debris, yard waste containers are available for rent. Please call Waste Management to schedule a delivery.
- 6. Trash, recycling, and bulky item service remain on schedule.

The Virginia Beach Landfill and Resource Recovery Center, located at 1989 Jake Sears Road, is available to Virginia Beach residents for a wide range of recycling and disposal needs, including yard waste and tree limbs. Hours of operation are 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday.
