ASSOCIATION NEWS:

CAC (Citizens Advisory Committee) Meeting, 16 March: We discussed the VB Project Lifesaver and Rick Boyles, an Interim Director of the CCO (Council of Civic Organizations) discussed the upcoming March 23 Election of Officers. I am also a CCO Interim Director. Dr. Laurie Fox from the VA Tech Ag Research Center discussed their operations and a potential move of the facility to Pungo. I've invited her to speak at our August meeting. SGT Barnestein from the 3rd Precinct came and presented crime stats and fielded a variety of questions from the audience.



Disaster Prep- Emergency Decontamination of Water

- Use **bottled water** or water you have properly prepared and stored as an emergency water supply.
- Boil water, if you do not have bottled water. Boiling is sufficient to kill pathogenic bacteria, viruses and protozoa (WHO, 2015).
 - If water is cloudy, let it settle and filter it through a clean cloth, paper towel, or coffee filter.
 - Bring water to a rolling boil for at least one minute. At altitudes above 5,000 feet (1,000 meters), boil water for three minutes.
 - Let water cool naturally and store it in clean containers with covers.
 - To improve the flat taste of boiled water, add one pinch of salt to each quart or liter of water, or pour the water from one clean container to another several times.
- Disinfect water using household bleach, if you can't boil water. Only use regular, unscented chlorine bleach products that are suitable for disinfection and sanitization as indicated on the label. The label may say that the active ingredient contains 6 or 8.25% of sodium hypochlorite. Do not use scented, color safe, or bleaches with added cleaners.
 - If water is cloudy, let it settle and filter it through a clean cloth, paper towel, or coffee filter.
 - Locate a clean dropper from your medicine cabinet or emergency supply kit.
 - Locate a fresh liquid chlorine bleach or liquid chlorine bleach that is stored at room temperatures for less than one year.
 - Use the table on the next page as a guide to decide how much bleach you should add to the water, for example, add 8 drops of 6 % bleach or 6 drops of 8.25% bleach to each gallon of water. Double the amount of bleach if the water is cloudy, colored, or very cold.
 - Stir and let stand for 30 minutes. The water should have a slight chlorine odor. If it doesn't, repeat the dosage and let stand for another 15 minutes before use.
 - If the chlorine taste is too strong, pour the water from one clean container to another and let it stand for a few hours before use.

Crime Prevention:



WHAT IS "BANK JUGGING"?

The term is used to describe suspects who sit in bank parking lots and watch customers go in and out of a bank. The suspects follow the customers they believe are in possession of cash and look for an opportunity to burglarize their vehicles or rob them directly.

THINGS TO BE AWARE OF WHEN BANKING:

- · Occupied vehicles backed into parking spaces with clear view of the front doors of the bank, ATM or commercial drive thru line
- · Vehicles with dark tinted windows with little or no visibility of the occupants
- Vehicles arriving at bank with no occupants entering the bank
- Vehicles changing parking spaces
- Vehicles with multiple occupants

HOW CAN YOU PROTECT YOURSELF?

- Always be aware of your surroundings
- · Conceal money before leaving the bank. Never openly carry bank bags, envelopes or coin boxes.
- Be aware of anyone following you from the area of a bank
- If you suspect you are being targeted, call 911 from your cell phone and keep the dispatcher informed of your location, the direction you are traveling, and drive until a marked police car is able to locate you.
- Do not leave or try to hide your bank bag or bank envelope in your vehicle when you exit at your next destination, even if it's your residence.

March 2023

19th - 20th

Good for planting cucumbers, melons, pumpkins, and other vine crops. Set strawberry plants. Good days for transplanting. Favorable days for planting beets, carrots, radishes, salsify, turnips, peanuts, and other root crops.

21st - 22nd

Cultivate and spray, do general farm work, but no planting.

23rd - 24th

Favorable for planting crops bearing yield above the ground.

25th - 27th


Seeds planted now tend to rot in ground.

28th - 29th

Excellent for sowing seedbeds and flower gardens. Best planting days for aboveground crops, especially peas, beans, cucumbers, and squash where climate permits.

30th – 31st A most barren period, best for killing plant pests or doing chores around the farm.

History Corner: This month in US History:

March 1, 1781 - Formal ratification of the <u>Articles of Confederation</u> was announced by Congress.

March 5, 1770 - The <u>Boston Massacre</u> occurred as a group of rowdy Americans harassed British soldiers who then opened fire, killing five and injuring six

March 5, 1946 - The <u>"Iron Curtain" speech</u> was delivered by Winston Churchill at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri.

March 6, 1836 - Fort Alamo fell to Mexican troops led by General Santa Anna.

March 9, 1864 - <u>Ulysses S. Grant</u> was commissioned as a Lieutenant General and became commander of the Union armies.

March 9, 1862 - Ironclad ships, the Monitor and the Merrimack, battle in the Civil war.

March 11, 1918 - The 'Spanish' influenza first reached America as 107 soldiers become sick at Fort Riley, Kansas.

March 17, 1776 - Early in the <u>American Revolutionary War</u> the British completed their evacuation of Boston following a successful siege conducted by Patriots.

March 19, 2003 - The United States launched an attack against Iraq to topple dictator Saddam Hussein from power.
