In the Garden: August:

- Water **evergreen shrubs** like camellias and rhododendrons thoroughly this month to make sure that next year's buds develop well.
- Keep patio container plants well watered and feed with a **liquid fertiliser** every fortnight.
- Stake tall or top-heavy **dahlias** and **lilies** to prevent wind and rain damage. Dead-head lilies for a better flower display next year.
- Dead-head annual bedding plants and perennials to encourage them to flower into the autumn and stop them self-seeding.
- Cut back faded perennials to keep borders tidy.
- As penstemon flowers fade, cut them back to just above a leaf to encourage more flowers.
- Cut back **herbs** now to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves you can harvest before the frost.
- **Prune wisteria** after flowering by removing all the whippy side-shoots from the main branch framework to about 20cm from their base (about five leaves from the main stem).
- Trim any **lavender plants** after they've finished flowering to keep them compact.
- Collect ripened seeds and store them for next year. Leaving some seed heads in place can be attractive and allows the plant to self-seed in the surrounding soil.
- Mow meadows now to help scatter established wildflower seeds.
- Take cuttings of your favourite tender perennials such as **pelargoniums** and **fuchsia** to propagate them for next year.

History Corner:

- **August 2, 1776** In Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>.
- August 3, 1492 Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships
- August 5, 1583 The first British colony in North America was founded by Sir Humphrey Gilbert, a British navigator and explorer
- August 6, 1945 The first Atomic Bomb was dropped over the center of Hiroshima at 8:15 a.m., by the American B-29 bomber *Enola Gay*
- **August 7, 1990** Just five days after the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, President <u>George Bush</u> ordered Desert Shield.
- August 9, 1974 Effective at noon, <u>Richard M. Nixon resigned</u> the presidency as a result of the Watergate scandal
- **August 14, 1935** President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act establishing the system which guarantees pensions to those who retire at age 65
- August 14, 1945 Following the two Atomic Bomb drops and believing that continuation of the war would only result in further loss of Japanese lives, delegates of Emperor Hirohito accepted Allied surrender terms
- August 17, 1978 The first transatlantic balloon trip was completed by three Americans;
- August 18, 1920 The 19th <u>Amendment</u> to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting women the right to vote
- August 21, 1959 President <u>Dwight D. Eisenhower</u> signed a proclamation admitting Hawaii to the Union as the 50th state

<u>Disaster Prep</u> –Prepare your Pets for a Disaster

Make a Plan

If you have a plan in place for you and your pets, you will likely encounter less difficulty, stress and worry when you need to make a decision during an emergency. If local officials ask you to evacuate, that means your pet should evacuate too. If you leave your pets behind, they may end up lost, injured or worse.

Things to include in your plan:

- Have an evacuation plan for your pet. Many public shelters and hotels do not allow pets inside. Know a safe place where you can take your pets before disasters and emergencies happen.
- **Develop a buddy system.** Plan with neighbors, friends or relatives to make sure that someone is available to care for or evacuate your pets if you are unable to do so.
- **Have your pet microchipped**. Make sure to keep your address and phone number up-to-date and include contact information for an emergency contact outside of your immediate area.
- Contact your local emergency management office, animal shelter or animal control
 office to get additional advice and information if you're unsure how to care for your pet in case
 of an emergency.

Build a Kit for Your Pet

Just as you do with your family's emergency supply kit, think first about the basics for survival, such as food and water. Have two kits, one larger kit if you are sheltering in place and one lightweight version for if you need to evacuate. Review your kits regularly to ensure that their contents, especially foods and medicines, are fresh.

Here are some items you may want to include in an emergency kit for your pet:





- Food. Keep several days' supply of food in an airtight, waterproof container.
- Water. Store a water bowl and several days' supply of water.
- Medicine. Keep an extra supply of the medicine your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container.
- **First aid kit.** Talk to your veterinarian about what is most appropriate for your pet's emergency medical needs.
- Collar with ID tag and a harness or leash. Include a backup leash, collar and ID tag. Have copies of your pet's registration information and other relevant documents in a waterproof container and available electronically.
- Traveling bag, crate or sturdy carrier, ideally one for each pet.

- **Grooming items.** Pet shampoo, conditioner and other items, in case your pet needs some cleaning up.
- **Sanitation needs.** Include pet litter and litter box (if appropriate), newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs.
- A picture of you and your pet together. If you become separated from your pet during an
 emergency, a picture of you and your pet together will help you document ownership and allow
 others to assist you in identifying your pet.
- **Familiar items.** Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit. Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.

Safety Patrol-School Safety Tips

Backpacks »

Choose a backpack for your child carefully; it should have ergonomically designed features to enhance safety and comfort.

- Ask your children to use both straps when wearing their backpack to evenly distribute the weight on their shoulders
- Don't overstuff a backpack; it should weigh no more than 5% to 10% of your child's body weight
- Rolling backpacks should be used cautiously since they can create a trip hazard in crowded school hallways

Playgrounds and Sports »

- To reduce strangulation hazards on playgrounds, have your child leave necklaces and jackets with drawstrings at home
- A few bumps and bruises can be expected when your child plays sports, but <u>head injuries should never be</u> ignored

Bus Riders »

Teach your children school bus safety rules and practice with them.

- Go to the bus stop with your child to teach them the proper way to get on and off the bus
- Teach your children to stand 6 feet (or three giant steps) away from the curb
- If your child must cross the street in front of the bus, teach him or her to walk on the side of the road until they are 10 feet ahead of the bus; your child and the bus driver should always be able to see each other
- Get the facts on bus safety from Injury Facts

Driving Your Child to School »

Stay alert and avoid distracted driving.

- Obey school zone speed limits and follow your school's drop-off procedure
- Make eye contact with children who are crossing the street
- Never pass a bus loading or unloading children
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them to safely enter and exit the bus


