Bylaws Update: The CYPT CA VB bylaws have been re-written and put on the table for discussion and voting in May. Key changes are:

- 1. Removed the term "Constitution" as not consistent with Virginia law
- 2. Map of the neighborhood now an integral part of document
- 3. Clarifies roles of officers and expenses in excess of \$1000 subject to members approval
- 4. Quorum required for voting reduced to 10% from 20%
- 5. Standing Committees updated to reflect current operation
- 6. Prior amendments on dissolution and indemnification are inserted into the main document
- 7. Approval of the members required for certain provisions

The new draft bylaws will be posted on the website.

SCAM Alert:

1. Amazon Prime 'Zombie' Listings

Commonly referred to as 'zombie' listings, these are product pages in which customer reviews don't match the described product. What happens is scammers will search for inactive or abandoned listings with lots of great reviews.

"Once they find their target, they take control of the listing and update the images and descriptions to match the product they are selling", says Patrick Connelly from Stellar Villa, a wall art company from Brooklyn.

"As a result, what was once a product page for a pair of socks with 1,000 5-star reviews, becomes a product page for a coffee mug. The scammer benefits because their brand new product displays 1,000 5-star reviews. At first glance, it appears to be a successful product that has been on Amazon for quite some time."

However, in reality, none of the reviews are for the product you are thinking of purchasing. As a wary consumer, you need to do your due diligence. Read through a couple of customer reviews pages, don't only look at the review rating. This is one of the most common Amazon scams out there.

"Also, examine customer submitted images of the product. If you see repeated reviews or images that describe a product completely different than the one depicted in the listing, this could be a tell-tale sign of a zombie listing", adds Connelly.

CYPT Crime Stats Year to Date:

The Virginia Beach Open Data Portal shows no crime incidents for Cypress Point in December 2024 or to this point in 2025. It has still not been updated. I have pointed this out to the city.

In the Garden:

The winter season allows us all to enjoy a slower pace, but that doesn't mean pausing on yard work altogether. In fact, the month of February is a great time to start getting the garden into shape ahead of more busy activity in the spring.

Forcing is the practice of getting a plant to grow and flower outside of its natural growing season. You can do this with many plants at different times of the year, but February is a prime time to force spring-flowering trees and shrubs, and you'll need some particularly accurate <u>pruning shears</u> to make the most of each plant. Ideal candidates for some late-winter blooms include forsythia, flowering quince and pussywillow, but check to make sure they have come out of their winter dormancy before you get to work; you want these plants to have already begun to bud before you remove them and take them indoors.

To force, select branches with rounder, plumper buds that are more likely to contain flowers (as opposed to leaves). Gently remove from the rest of the plant with sharp, clean cuts – aim for about a foot or two in length. Try not to remove too many branches from a single plant and spread out your clipping, so that the remaining shape is still balanced and attractive.

Place the branches in a tall container of water, in a cool indoor location (60 - 65 degrees Fahrenheit), and change out the water on a daily basis during the forcing period. Mist regularly to keep buds hydrated. When flowers begin to appear, you can move the branches to a sunnier location, but remember that cooler temperatures will help to extend the blooming period.

History Corner:

February 21, 1972 - President <u>Richard Nixon</u> arrived in China for historic meetings with Chairman Mao Tse-tung and Premier Chou En-lai.

February 23, 1991 - In Desert Storm, the Allied ground offensive began after a devastating month-long air campaign targeting Iraqi troops in both Iraq and Kuwait.




CYPT Crime Stats Year to Date:

VBPD Releases 2024 Crime Data

Today Virginia Beach Police Chief Paul Neudigate presented detailed 2024 crime statistics to Virginia Beach City Council on Part I crimes to include Violent Crimes (homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault) and Property Crimes (burglary, motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle, all other larceny). He also presented data on fatal traffic crashes in the city in 2024.

Highlights

- Of the 7,977 Part I crimes that occurred in 2024, only 5.5% were violent. In fact, violent crimes are down 22.3% compared to 2023 and down 21% compared to the previous three-year average (2021 2023), making 2024 the lowest year for violent crimes in the last five years.
- Part I property crime is down 4.3% compared to 2023, from 7,882 offenses to 7,541. Of
 particular note, larcenies from motor vehicles continue to drop, down 17%, and thefts of motor
 vehicles are down 27% compared to 2023 the lowest either number has been in five years!
- Shooting incidents decreased by 49% in 2024 from 73 to 37, and shooting victims decreased by 56% from 88 to 39. Related, VBPD seized or came in possession of 1,221 illegally possessed firearms in 2024.
- The homicide rate fell by 46% in 2024, from 24 to 13. Of those, 100% have been positively cleared. VBPD's homicide clearance rate continues to be far superior to the national average of 52% (as reported by the FBI in 2022).
- Citywide vehicle crashes are down 4% since 2023 and 7% since 2022.
- Citywide fatal vehicle crashes are down 31% since 2023.
- When compared to neighboring cities in Hampton Roads, at 4.8 per 100,000 residents, Virginia
 Beach had the lowest number of fatal vehicle crashes in 2024.

Chief Neudigate touted the determination of VBPD personnel, the use of technology, the VBPD Real Time Crime Center, and ongoing regional teamwork and collaboration in the continued downward trend in Part 1 crime in 2024.

"In addition to the great police work and community assistance, technology aids those efforts with expanded citywide camera network and regional license plate readers playing a key role," said Police Chief Paul Neudigate. "By providing real-time data and capturing essential details like vehicle license plates, we can quickly identify suspect vehicles to aid our investigations. These technologies routinely enhance our ability to keep the community safe and ensure we use all available resources to protect our community."

Virginia Beach Parks & Recreation to Host Job Fair on Feb. 27

Virginia Beach Parks & Recreation (VBPR) will host a job fair to find energetic, dedicated employees to fill hundreds of spring and summer part-time positions with pay starting at \$15.08 an hour.

The department brings on approximately 350-500 staff members annually to fill these seasonal positions that have the potential to extend into the fall. Positions with particularly high demand include childcare staff, groundskeeping and lifeguards.
