In the Garden: September Garden Planning & Reflection



It's time to jot down the successes and shortcomings of this garden season and start developing goals for next year. We've highlighted some planning essentials that will help you grow and excel even more as a gardener.

- Grab your garden journal and make a note of high-performing and underwhelming plant varieties. Add your favorites to your list to buy seeds or plants for next year.
- Make some notes in your garden journal about the weather and how it impacted your garden this year. Were there any significant storms, droughts, or heavy rains?
- Decide which spring <u>flower bulbs to plant this fall</u> and buy them from garden centers when the selection is at its best.
- o It's not too early to acquire your seeds for spring if they are available.
- Sketch and/or photograph your <u>vegetable garden layouts</u> and keep them in your garden journal. This way, you will know how to rotate your crops for next year.

- Think about ways to add color and <u>draw beneficial pollinators to your fall gardens</u>.
 Consider planting nasturtiums, marigolds, asters, cosmos, mums, and anemones.
- Plan out your <u>fall flower planters</u>. Summer blooms are fading, but there are many opportunities to add color and visual interest to your landscape. Try pairing some fall showstoppers like heuchera, mums, asters, ornamental cabbage, and variegated ivy.
- Make a note of any diseased or spotty plants as you remove them from your garden.
 Include the variety of plants and where it was planted, and discard the debris far away from your garden or compost pile.
- o Decide if you will plant a cover crop this fall and acquire the seeds for planting.
- Consider season-extending tools like hoop-houses, cold frames, and greenhouses. You
 can also stock up on row covers to <u>protect crops from upcoming frosts</u>. Be prepared for
 any early frosts.
- Look around your yard for anything that needs repair or change. Would you like to <u>start</u> <u>a compost area</u>? Does a fence need repair? Does your vegetable garden need more secure fencing?

History Corner:



September 2, 1864 - During the American Civil War, Atlanta was captured by Sherman's Army. "Atlanta is ours, and fairly won," General William T. Sherman telegraphed President Lincoln.

September 2, 1945 - President Harry Truman declared V-J Day (Victory over Japan Day) commemorating the formal Japanese surrender to the Allies aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo

September 3, 1783 - The Treaty of Paris was signed by John Adams, Ben Franklin and John Jay, formally ending the American Revolutionary War between Britain and the United States.

September 4, 1609 - The island of Manhattan was discovered by navigator Henry Hudson.

September 5, 1774 - The First Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia with 56 delegates, representing every colony, except Georgia. Attendants included Patrick Henry, George Washington, Sam Adams and John Hancock.

September 9, 1776 - The United States came into existence as the Continental Congress changed the name of the new American nation from the United Colonies.

September 13, 1814 - The Battle of Fort Henry in Baltimore Harbor occurred, observed by Francis Scott Key aboard a ship

September 16, 1620 - The *Mayflower* ship departed from England, bound for America with 102 passengers and a small crew

September 17, 1787 - At the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, delegates from twelve states voted unanimously to approve the proposed U.S. Constitution.

September 17, 1862 - The bloodiest day in U.S. military history occurred as General Robert E. Lee and the Confederate armies were stopped at Antietam in Maryland

September 22, 1776 - During the American Revolution, Nathan Hale was executed without a trial after he was caught spying on British troops on Long Island, his last words, "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

September 25, 1789 - The first U.S. Congress proposed 12 Amendments to the Constitution, ten of which, comprising the Bill of Rights, were ratified.

September 29, 1789 - Congress created the United States Army, consisting of 1,000 enlisted men and officers.

Code Enforcement Issues:

What types of complaints does Code Enforcement address? Code Enforcement investigates complaints of potential violations on private property only. Common violations:



Code 16-40)









It is unlawful for any property owner or occupant to store Provisions of the code are enforced that govern the preparation, dilapidated furniture, appliances, machinery, building materials or storage and disposal of waste. These provisions also address waste any other item which is rusted, wrecked, junked, dismantled or receptacle placement and storage, dumpster screening and private inoperative on private property. Licensed junk dealers are exempt



Overgrown Grass/Weeds (City Code 23-50b)

It is unlawful for any property owner or occupant to allow grass or weeds to grow over 10 inches in height.



Accumulation of Trash and Garbage (City Code 23-50a)

This code prohibits any accumulation of trash, garbage, or litter on Commercial vehicles parked in residential or apartment districts are


Second District Congressional Debate To Be Held on Campus: October 11
